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A Sister to Every Girl Scout. We know that when girls have access to safe spaces where they feel like they belong, adults who care and mentor them, and a supportive peer network, they are more likely to discover who they are, build confidence in their own abilities, and grow into resilient leaders who thrive in school, in their careers, and in life.

This is the power of Girl Scouts. More than just a program, the experiences that a girl has in Girl Scouts shape how she understands herself and what she believes is possible. And that lasts far beyond her last flag ceremony, troop meeting, or cookie booth. Girl Scouts grow into women who are more likely to lead, volunteer, pursue education, and give back to their communities.

We served more than 6,400 girls this year, including almost 1,700 new Girl Scouts. This would not have been possible without our volunteer leadership—you are transforming curiosity into confidence and potential into purpose—and we appreciate everything you do for our incredible girls. It is the troop that is at the heart of a Girl Scout’s experience, and the bonds that are formed there can last a lifetime.

We are particularly proud to have partnered with all Florida Girl Scout councils on the release of the State of the Florida Girl Report. This report has become an important resource for understanding and addressing the unique challenges girls face across the Sunshine State. It has allowed us to have meaningful conversations with community leaders, policy-makers, and advocates; and reinforced

the importance of supportive, girl-focused environments like Girl Scouts for building girls of courage, confidence and character who will make our world a better place.

The launch of the LEAD (Leadership, Empowerment, Achievement, Discovery) Program has allowed us to bring Girl Scouting to even more girls through partnerships with local schools and the financial support of generous funders. This program served over 700 girls this year, and interest in expanding it to more schools is growing. We are so proud of our Girl Scouts and all they accomplished this year. Locally, 226 Girl Scouts earned High Awards this year, completing more than 6,000 hours of community service through these awards alone; and \$19,000 in scholarships were awarded to eight incredible Girl Scouts to support their college dreams. More than 3,800 girls took part in the iconic Girl Scout Cookie Sale, with almost 300 reaching Extreme Team status for selling 1000+ boxes and 63 who joined the CEO Extreme Team by selling 2,000+ boxes. Our top 3 Cookie sellers sold a combined 18,241 boxes.

We honored 14 incredible women at our Emerald Awards events in Palm Beach, Broward and Martin Counties, raising nearly \$350,000 for Girl Scouts. And 183 Girl Scout volunteers were celebrated through our annual volunteer recognition program. Our volunteers are the heart of Girl Scouts and we couldn’t do this important work without you.

We are grateful for another year serving our incredible Mission. Thank you for being on this journey with us.

State of the Florida Girl Report



In an unprecedented effort to amplify the voices of Florida, Girl Scouts of Southeast Florida unveiled the State of the Florida Girl Report in December of 2024. This groundbreaking report showcases the unique challenges facing girls across the state. The report, commissioned by the Girl Scouts of Florida Association, which is comprised of the six Florida Girl Scout councils, is a commitment to ensure that all girls can reach their full potential.

Using primary data sources, including the U.S. Census, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the Florida Department of Education, the report disaggregates data by gender to understand variances between girls and boys. It also incorporates insights from experts at leading institutions across Florida.

Highlighting critical issues across key pillars – emotional wellness, social wellbeing, physical health, and academic performance – **the report underscores the urgent need to provide girls with the resources and support they require to thrive.**

The Florida Girl Report brings to light some startling realities about the circumstances impacting the daily wellbeing of girls in Florida. Girl Scouts is using what has been learned and focusing resources to change the narrative for girls and equip them with opportunities and experiences they deserve to grow into successful, healthy, well-adjusted young women ready to lead life with confidence.

It starts with awareness—understanding the challenges that today’s girls uniquely face. **It takes action**—to remove the pressure for girls to fit into societal standard of what she should look like, how she should feel, and what she should do. **And it takes access**—to a supportive, all-girl environment often not available through family or school.

By providing girls with positive adult relationships, supportive peer communities, and unparalleled leadership programs, Girl Scouts has been building girls of courage, confidence and character for more than 100 years.

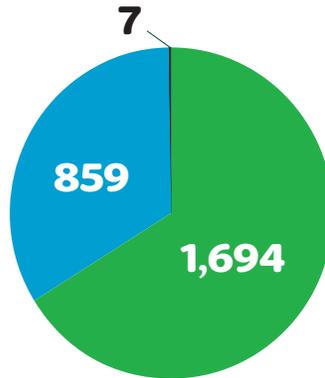

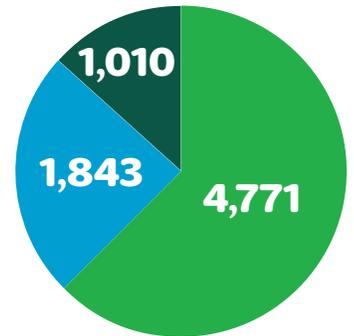

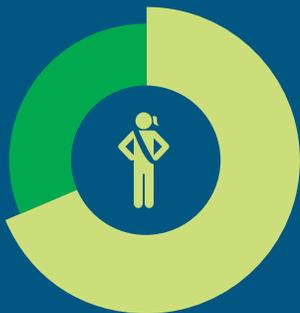

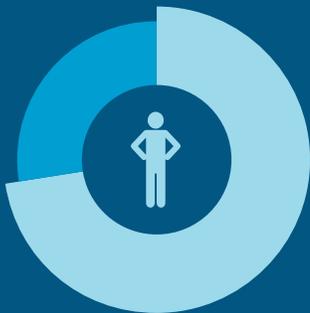

Introduced in 2014, this prestigious honor is awarded to volunteers who have made extraordinary contributions to the Girl Scout mission, who give their time and talents generously through consistent and far-reaching acts of volunteerism that have strengthened the organization and shaped the lives of countless young women.

A lifelong champion of volunteerism, Friedman has served in numerous volunteer leadership roles within Girl Scouts, including as a troop leader, trainer, and mentor. Her passion for guiding young girls, with a special affinity for leading Daisies, has provided them with an exceptional start with Girl Scouts.

Friedman has also been instrumental in supporting fellow volunteers, offering orientation for new leaders and sharing her extensive knowledge and experience to help others succeed. She is also known for organizing engaging programs, including her legendary Fire Circles, an outdoor experience that introduces young Girl Scouts to fire safety, songs, games, night hikes, and more. She is a past recipient of the Volunteer of Excellence Award and has received the Thanks Badge and the Thanks II Badge, which is the highest recognition a Girl Scout volunteer can earn.

Reflecting on her journey, Friedman said, "I always knew Girl Scouts was an organization I wanted my daughters to be part of, but I never imagined how much it would become a part of me. Volunteering has given me the opportunity to watch girls grow into strong, confident women who go on to become community leaders, teachers, and professionals."

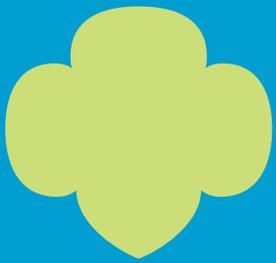
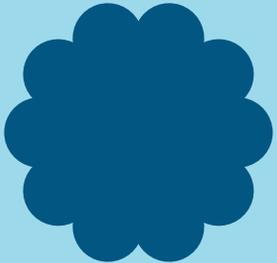
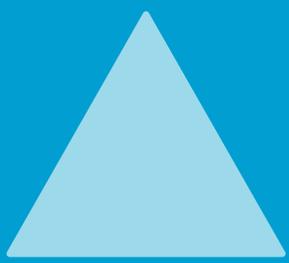

RAISING FUNDS TO SUPPORT GIRLS

Girl Scouts of Southeast Florida proudly hosted three Emerald Awards luncheons across Martin, Palm Beach, and Broward counties, bringing together 662 guests to celebrate exceptional women making a difference in their communities.

Through the generous support of sponsors, donors, and community partners, these signature events raised nearly \$350,000 to help ensure that every girl in our service area has the opportunity to be a Girl Scout.

During the luncheons, 14 remarkable women were honored for their professional achievements, leadership, and community impact—including two recipients of the prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award for Philanthropy. Each honoree exemplifies what it means to be a changemaker and serves as an inspiring role model for today's girls, embodying the values and spirit of Girl Scouting in action.





Girl Experience

ENTREPRENEURSHIP

When a girl learns about entrepreneurship, she builds a lifetime of skills and confidence. Girl Scouts teaches girls about goal setting, decision making, money management, business ethics, and people skills. These transferable skills help make girls life ready as they look toward their future.

397 girls and 235 adults participated in Entrepreneurship programs (outside of the Cookie Program)

S.M.A.R.T. Cookie | 11/16/2024

Girl Scouts are tough cookies who never crumble! S.M.A.R.T. Cookie is designed to help girls increase their financial literacy, better understand goal setting, and boost their cookie selling expertise through workshops and expo hall booths. Girls who attend S.M.A.R.T. Cookie become Savvy, Motivated, Artistic, Responsible, and Technical all in one day!



LIFE SKILLS

Girl Scouts helps girls prepare for their future whether that's the next grade, college, or the workforce. Girls learn about civic engagement and local government, healthy living habits for both the mind and body, practice global citizenship, and establish good communication skills.

1,196 girls and 634 adults participated in Life Skills programs

Badge Bash | 10/5/2024 & 10/6/2024

Badge Bash was an exceptional event where Girl Scouts engaged in the exciting journey of earning badges across all pillars. This event offered a unique blend of engaging activities, creative projects, and hands-on experiences, designed to ignite curiosity and foster leadership skills. In addition to girl activities, adult sessions allowed adults to earn their certifications in CPR/First Aid and Archery.



OUTDOORS

Outdoor activities provided by Girl Scouts allow girls to experience skill building through camping, outdoor, and environmental activities for all age and skill levels. Girls learn to advocate for nature and how to become champions of our precious environment.

444 girls and 305 adults participated in Outdoor programs (including 175 Summer Camp attendees)

Shark Tagging | 4/18/2025

A day of shark tagging with Sharks4Kids and the Guy Harvey Research Institute was an unforgettable adventure for older Girl Scouts. Participants joined marine biologists on the water to learn about shark research firsthand. They helped set baited lines and eagerly awaited to see which shark species they would encounter while learning about sharks' role in the ocean ecosystem.



STEM

Research shows girls are keenly interested in science, technology, engineering, and math and excel at it. Yet, starting as early as elementary school, girls often don't pursue STEM.. Girl Scouts gives girls an opportunity to think like an engineer and to explore how programmers solve problems.

724 girls and 161 adults participated in STEM programs

STEMapalooza | 8/23/2025

STEMapalooza allowed Girl Scouts and their families exclusive after-hours access to the Museum of Discovery and Science for a night overflowing with hands-on exploration and fascinating "-ologies," including Entomology, Criminology, Marine Biology, Meteorology, Oceanography, and more. A private IMAX documentary capped off an unforgettable night.



Product Sale



2025 COOKIE SALE

Thanks to 3,810 girls, 417 troops, and all the volunteers, family, and friends that support them, the 2025 GSSEF Cookie Sale Program provided girls with incredible opportunities to learn how to run their very own businesses! Girl Scouts **Embraced Possibility** as they learned entrepreneurial skills and transformed them into action to achieve their goals.

This year 1,257,686 boxes of cookies were sold. Of the more than 1.2 million boxes, 493,461 of them were sold through Digital Cookie - 39% of total sales, up from 36% of total last sales year. The cookie sale grossed \$7,658,764 with over \$1.1 million going directly to our Girl Scout troops as troop proceeds.

COOKIES FOR THE MILITARY

This year, 44,947 boxes of cookies were donated through the Cookies for the Military program, increasing our overall boxes donated to more than 858,000 since the campaign started in 2009. After this year's campaign was over, thirty-three girls earned an invitation to a special packing event at Forgotten Soldiers where they personally packed cookies into care packages, including notes of support and encouragement, that will go to our soldiers serving overseas.

CORPORATE COOKIE CONNECTIONS

Sixty-one Girl Scouts learned the 5 P's: Prospect, Proposal and Pitch, Procure and Partner by completing the Corporate Cookie Connections patch program. Because of their hard work and persuasive presentation skills, \$31,620 in corporate purchases were generated by 50 participating girls. **Congratulations to Sadie S. from Troop 10804 who was the top corporate connector securing \$4,620 in support.**

EXTREME TEAM

An impressive, goal-focused group of 285 girls reached Extreme Team status in 2025, selling at least 1000+ boxes of cookies. This group of high achievers sold a combined total of **417,747 boxes of cookies**, 33% of our 2025 Cookie Season total.

High Awards & Scholarships

27 GOLD AWARDS

The Girl Scout Gold Award sets girls apart in the best possible way by allowing them to direct their passions, skills, and energy into meaningful projects. This year 27 Girl Scouts from our council earned the organization’s highest award. **Perhaps even more impressive is that their collective projects contributed more than 2,500 hours in our communities.** Girl Scout partnered with dozens of local organizations with projects that impacted thousands of lives. The Gold Award Class of 2025 addressed issues surrounding mental health awareness, human trafficking, food insecurity, environmental sustainability, water safety, and expanded on critical conversations about facing difficult medical diagnoses and detrimental cultural stereotyping. Most people would be shocked to learn that high school students are tackling such transformative topics, but our Girl Scouts didn’t just talk about improving a situation – they made plans, built teams, put in a lot of time, and made our world a better place.

66 SILVER AWARDS

This year, 66 girls earned our organization’s highest award for Cadette Girl Scouts and were celebrated at our 5th annual Silver Award Showcase. **With 30 projects, local Girl Scouts contributed 3,500 hours through partnerships with 20 local non-profit organizations, 12 schools, 3 municipalities** – as well as countless students, senior citizens, animals, and miles of shoreline. Silver Award projects addressed issues surrounding care for our aging populations, mental health, self-defense, food insecurity, environmental sustainability, and honoring veterans. All projects demonstrated the determination, passion, and creativity that lives inside these exceptional Cadettes.

133 BRONZE AWARDS

The Bronze Award is the highest honor for a Junior Girl Scout; it recognizes a significant, long-term community impact project while fostering skills like leadership, teamwork, and problem-solving. This year when 133 local Girl Scouts earned the Bronze Award, they explored their interests, discussed issues facing their communities, discovered new passions, and **built big time confidence by working with others to make a positive change with 39 projects, a 29% increase over last year.** In partnership with nurturing adults, the Award-earning process offers tools to help her build life-ready skills like confidence, compromise, and communication. There’s no other place where girls get the structure and inspiration as 4th and 5th graders to harness a passion for helping others and make their mark on the world.

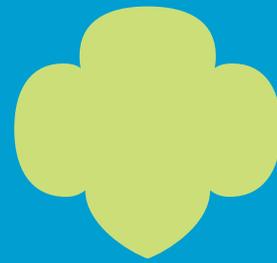
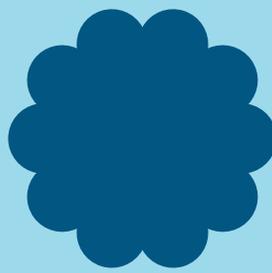
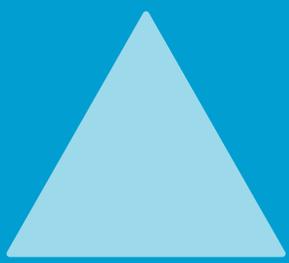

“Marine Education to Improve our Florida Waterways”

Hannah’s Gold Award project tackled the lack of community awareness about the effects of everyday actions on Florida’s waterways by researching environmental challenges and identifying education gaps. She collaborated with local officials and experts to develop accessible resources, including a website and QR-coded signage at the U.S. Sailing Center, to educate the public on boating safety and sustainability. Her efforts inspired community members to adopt positive changes, and the lasting impact of her project is ensured through ongoing website access and durable educational signage that will continue to inform future visitors.

Our council’s scholarship program has grown exponentially since its inception in 2008. In fact, through our ongoing relationships with generous donors, **the award amounts have increased 2,500% in just 17 years.** This has been translated into scholarship awards for 56 local girls who’ve set out to gain knowledge and enter the workforce, the world of adulthood, and as members of their communities with a unique set of leadership skills and civic mindedness that comes from our extraordinary Girl Scout programs.

LEAD Program



Building girls of courage, confidence and character has been the foundation of Girl Scouting for more than a hundred years. When a girl has a safe space where she feels like she belongs, access to caring adults, and a supportive peer network, she is poised to thrive.

Through the LEAD Program, which stands for **Leadership, Empowerment, Achievement, Discovery**, Girl Scouts have access to the full Girl Scout Leadership experience – regardless of background or barrier. Participation in the LEAD Program strengthens life skills and supports mental and emotional well-being for girls in underserved communities where access to enriching after-school activities is limited. **This year 559 girls from Broward County and 188 girls from Palm Beach County were Girl Scouts because of the LEAD Program.**

This donor-supported program utilizes paid facilitators to bring the research-based Girl Scout curriculum directly to girls, with all program necessities, including uniforms, badges, and supplies, provided at no cost to participants. Through structured meetings, girls engage in comprehensive programming across four key pillars: STEM, Life Skills, Entrepreneurship, and Outdoors, developing essential skills while empowering girls to become leaders who will change their community and the world.

Through the LEAD Program, girls in Troop 10458 earned their Daisy Petals while Brownies earned the Presentation and Budding Entrepreneur Badge, and Cadettes earned the Business Creator Badge. The girls also met first responders from the Coral Springs-Parkland Fire Rescue Department and toured a fire engine and ambulance. The troop celebrated the end of their 2024-25 Girl Scout year by hosting a Troop Tea Party where they performed Girl Scout songs, were presented with the badges and awards they earned, and thanked parents who worked alongside their leaders throughout the year. **Girls in the troop shared that the Troop Tea Party was “the best day ever!”**

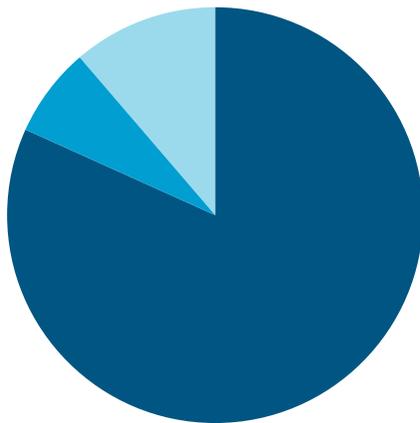
