The Unhoused - Care & Compassion Kits

Activity 1: Basic Hygiene Care Kits

Goal: Make hygiene kits to donate to a shelter or keep in your car to hand out.

Supplies Needed:

- Gallon-size resealable bag
- Toothbrush and toothpaste
- Bar of soap or travel-size body wash
- Deodorant
- Comb or brush
- Pair of socks
- Granola bar or snack
- A kind note or drawing

Instructions:

- 1. Gather your supplies and place them neatly inside the bag.
- 2. Write a kind message or draw a cheerful picture.
- 3. Label the bag if needed (e.g., "Adult Male," "Teen Girl").
- 4. Deliver to a local shelter or keep a few in your family car.

Activity 2: Weather-Ready Survival Pouches

Goal: Create seasonal support kits for those experiencing homelessness.

Supplies Needed:

- Zip pouch or drawstring bag
- Travel-size sunscreen
- Bottled water or sports drink packet
- Emergency poncho

• A small first-aid item (like bandages or ointment)

Instructions:

- 1. Choose items appropriate for your climate.
- 2. Place items in the pouch with a tag: "Packed with Care."
- 3. Give to a local mutual aid group or shelter.







Cancer Patients - Comfort & Cheer

Activity 1: Comfort Kits for Chemotherapy

Goal: Support patients with thoughtful items during treatment.

Supplies Needed:

- Gift bag or canvas tote
- Lip balm, hand lotion (unscented)
- Fuzzy socks or lap blanket
- Hard candies or lemon drops
- Puzzle book or journal
- Handmade card

Instructions:

- 1. Decorate your tote or bag with fabric markers or stickers.
- 2. Add each comfort item carefully.
- 3. Make a handmade card with a cheerful image or message.

Activity 2: Uplifting Art & Notes

Goal: Create uplifting messages and mini posters to brighten a hospital or treatment center.

Supplies Needed:

- Cardstock or heavy paper
- Markers, colored pencils, or crayons
- Stickers, washi tape, or ribbon

Instructions:

1. Write messages like "You're not alone" or "You are brave!"

- 2. Draw or color cheerful images—flowers, stars, sunshine.
- 3. Drop off with a note to the cancer center asking them to display or hand them out.







Animal Shelters - Helping Paws Projects

Activity 1: No-Sew Pet Toys

Goal: Make toys for dogs or cats in shelters.

Supplies Needed:

- Fleece strips or old t-shirt strips
- Scissors

Instructions:

- 1. Cut 3 strips of your chosen material at the same length. Play around with the length, for small dogs use shorter strips and larger ones for bigger dogs.
- 2. Tie a knot at one end, braid tightly, and knot the other end.
- 3. Test for durability, then pack for donation.
- 4. Wanna make it a little more challenging? Follow the linked video below for more advance braiding styles.

Activity 2: Cat Toy Activity: DIY Ribbon Wand Teaser

Goal: Create an interactive toy that encourages cats to jump, play, and exercise—just like a storebought teaser wand.

Supplies Needed:

- A wooden dowel (12"–18" long) or clean chopstick
- Assorted ribbon or fleece strips (approx. 12" each)
- Scissors
- Tape or hot glue (with adult help if using hot glue)
- Optional: Bells, pom-poms, or feathers for extra fun

Instructions:

- 1. Cut ribbons: Cut 4-6 ribbons or fleece strips about 12 inches long each.
- 2. Attach ribbons: Securely tape or glue the ribbons to the top of the dowel or chopstick.
 - o Tip: Wrap the attachment area with tape several times to make it extra secure.
- 3. Optional: Tie on a small bell or pom-pom at the end of a ribbon for added sound and interest.
- 4. Test it: Gently wave the wand to see the ribbons flutter and dance.
- 5. Package for donation: Deliver to your local animal shelter and label: "Ribbon Wands for Cats Handmade with Love."

Safety Tips:

- Avoid using string or yarn that can unravel and pose a choking hazard.
- Make sure everything is securely attached—cats love to tug and pounce!







Period Poverty - Dignity Kits & Empowerment Notes

Activity 1: Period Care Kits

Goal: Help ensure that women and girls have access to essential hygiene products, while also showing kindness and support through handwritten notes or decorated bags.

Supplies Needed:

- Zipper pouch, pencil case, or Ziplock bags
- Pads and panty liners
- Feminine wipes or tissue pack
- Handwritten affirmation card

Instructions:

- 1. Fill each pouch with hygiene items.
- 2. Add a note with kind words: "You are strong" or "Take care of yourself."
- 3. Donate to a local pantry, school nurse, or nonprofit.







Literacy - Reading for All

Activity 1: Reading Buddy Bags

Goal: Create a bag with a book, buddy, and bookmark.

Supplies Needed:

- New/gently used book
- Handmade bookmark
 - o Paper, Scissors, Markers, Stickers (Optional), Tassels (Optional)
- Stuffed animal or small plush toy
- Decorative bag or envelope

Instructions:

- 1. Choose a book for a younger reader.
- 2. Make a fun bookmark with a quote or drawing.
- 3. Add a small stuffed friend to accompany their reading.

Activity 2: DIY Alphabet or Sight Word Flashcards

Goal: Support early readers by creating colorful flashcards that help younger children learn letters, sounds, or common words in a fun, engaging way.

Supplies Needed:

- Index cards or cardstock cut into smaller pieces
- Markers, crayons, or colored pencils
- Optional: stickers or pictures cut from magazines
- Ziplock bag or rubber band to keep the set together

Instructions:

For Younger Kids (Grades K-3): Alphabet Cards


- 1. Use one card for each letter of the alphabet (A–Z).
- 2. Write the uppercase and lowercase letter on each card.
- 3. Decorate with a drawing or sticker of something that starts with that letter. (A for Apple, B for Bear, C for Cat, etc.)
- 4. Put all cards in a ziplock bag or tie them together with ribbon.


For Older Kids (Grades 4+): Sight Word or Vocabulary Flashcards

- 1. Choose 20–30 common sight words or age-appropriate vocabulary words.
- 2. Write one word per card.
- 3. Add the definition or use it in a sentence on the back.
- 4. Decorate or color-code for fun.

Optional Add-On: Include a note of encouragement for the future reader, such as:

- "Learning is an adventure!"
- "Keep going—you're doing amazing!"







Nursing Homes - Smiles & Flowers

Activity 1: Cards of Joy

Goal: Send thoughtful cards with positive messages.

Supplies Needed:

- Construction paper or blank cards
- Markers, crayons, stickers

Instructions:

- 1. Write messages like "Thinking of You!" or "Have a Beautiful Day!"
- 2. Decorate with colorful art—flowers, rainbows, or animals.
- 3. Deliver to a nursing home (call ahead first or mail).

Activity 2: Tissue Paper Flowers

Goal: Make long-lasting paper flowers to brighten someone's day.


Supplies Needed:

- Tissue paper (various colors)
- Pipe cleaners
- Scissors

Instructions:

- 1. Stack 3–5 sheets of tissue and fold accordion-style.
- 2. Twist a pipe cleaner around the center.
- 3. Gently fan out and fluff each layer.
- 4. Make a bouquet to donate or gift. Pair with a card from the first activity!

Where to Donate Your Service Items

For the Unhoused Activities

- Local homeless shelters (e.g., Salvation Army)
- Faith-based organizations offering outreach (churches, mosques, synagogues)
- Street outreach programs or mutual aid groups
- Police or fire stations (some accept kits to distribute)
- School social workers or guidance offices

For Cancer Patients Activities

- Local hospitals with oncology departments
- Cancer treatment centers
- Ronald McDonald House charities
- *Note: Be sure to call ahead

For Animal Shelters Activities

- City or county animal shelters
- Humane Society locations
- Local animal rescue groups or foster networks
- Veterinary clinics (check if they distribute comfort items)

For Period Poverty Activities

- Women's shelters or transitional housing centers
- Title I schools (coordinate with the nurse or social worker)
- Community pantries or free stores
- Local Libraries

For Literacy Activities

- Elementary schools and school libraries
- Little Free Libraries (you can also start your own)
- Boys & Girls Clubs or after-school programs
- Pediatric clinics or family shelters
- Local literacy nonprofits (like Reading Is Fundamental)

For Nursing Homes Activities

- Assisted living and memory care facilities
- Senior day programs or adult daycare centers
- Hospice organizations
- "Adopt-a-Grandparent" programs
- Community nursing homes
